A New CTE Opportunity at WHS

We're happy to announce that Woodland High School students will be able to enroll in a fully developed pre electrician program starting in the fall of 2024. Two cohorts of students will work out the shop at Woodland High School, one running in the morning from 7:30 to 9:50 and one running in the afternoon from 12:30 to 3:00. Woodland High School students will have priority access to the afternoon session. Students from around the area will have access to the morning session along with Woodland High School students. A course in metals and welding will be continue to be offered twice per day as currently available.

This program was developed in cooperation with our friends at Cascadia Technical Academy. Woodland High School staff will continue to teach the Metals course but the electrical trades pathway will be staffed by CTA instructor working on the WHS campus. A similar model is in place for the teachers' academy which has been operating from Columbia Elementary School and Woodland Middle School this school year. We are hopeful that partnerships like this will allow us to expand the CTE opportunities available to our students.

Career Outlook - Electrician

Essentially every building in use or currently being built is serviced by electricity, which means that electricians are in high demand. Electricians are responsible for installation of new electrical systems, updating old electrical systems, and maintaining existing electrical systems. Electricians must be familiar with local construction codes and practices and be able to various hand a power tools. Electricians work indoors and outdoors and in a wide variety of locations, including homes, factories, and construction sites.

About $\frac{2}{3}$ of all electricians work for electrical contractors. Another 8% are self employed. Typical working hours vary according to employment conditions. The median annual wage for electricians was \$60,240 in 2022, with those working for electrical contractors earning slightly less and those employed by government entities earning slightly more. Electricians employed in Washington, Oregon and California earn somewhat more than the national average.

Career Outlook cont.

The job growth outlook for electricians is excellent. Between 2022 and 2032, approximately 6% more electricians are projected to be required. This is double the rate of growth for all occupations combine and double the rate for all other construction trades occupations.

Most electricians enter the trade through a 4 to 5 year apprenticeship program. Some start by attending a trade or technical school. Graduates from these programs usually receive credit towards their apprenticeships. Most states also require electricians to pass a written examination and obtain a license. In all cases a high school diploma is required.

The new pre electrician program at WHS is a great way to explore this exciting career. We encourage all students who are interested to talk with their counselor.

Asha Riley will be the new Superintendent of Woodland Public Schools beginning July 1, 2024.

The Woodland Public Schools Board of Directors announced the selection of Asha Riley as the district's new superintendent, effective July 1, 2024. This decision, made at a Special Board Meeting, marks a significant milestone in the district's leadership as Ms. Riley prepares to take over from retiring Superintendent Michael Green, who has served the district for 17 years.

Beyond her professional roles, Ms. Riley has been an active member of the community, including serving as President of the Rotary Club of Woodland and participating in various educational associations.

CHARACTER STRONG LESSONS HAPPEN ONCE A WEEK IN GRIT (Gratitude - Resilience - Integrity - Team)


