Video Games

The good, the bad, and the ugly

I often see the incredible energy and passion our students bring to everything they do, and that certainly includes their engagement with video games. It's a topic that comes up frequently, and I understand that it can be a bit of a mystery, or even a source of concern. My hope is to offer a friendly and supportive perspective on the advantages and disadvantages of video games, so we can all better understand this evolving aspect of our teenagers' lives.

The Bright Side of Gaming

It might surprise you to hear that video games offer some benefits! Many of these games, especially those that involve strategy or puzzles, are fantastic for developing **critical thinking and problem-solving skills**. Our students are learning to analyze situations, make quick decisions, and adapt to new challenges – skills that are incredibly valuable in the classroom and beyond.

Beyond academics, gaming can actually be a powerful tool for **social connection**. While the image of a solitary gamer persists, many popular games are designed for multiplayer interaction. This means our students are often collaborating, communicating, and building friendships with their peers, both locally and globally. For some, especially those who might be a bit shyer, online communities can provide a comfortable space to connect and belong.

And let's not forget the physical benefits! Many action-oriented games can actually boost **hand-eye coordination and fine motor skills**. Plus, some games even spark **creativity**, allowing students to design, build, and tell stories in unique digital worlds.

Navigating the Challenges

Of course, like anything, there's a flip side. The most common concern I hear, and one we all need to be mindful of, is **time management**. When gaming becomes excessive, it can sometimes lead to neglecting homework, family responsibilities, physical activity, and even in-person social interactions. Our aim is always for a balanced life, and too much screen time can throw that off.

We also need to be aware of the potential for addiction.

While it's not a widespread issue, some students can develop an unhealthy reliance on gaming, which can impact their sleep, mood, and overall well-being. Keeping an eye on these patterns is important.

Another area to consider is **content**. Many games have ratings for a reason, and some contain violence or mature themes that aren't appropriate for all teenagers. Open conversations about game ratings and the content they encounter are crucial.

Lastly, with online interactions comes the possibility of **cyberbullying or negative experiences**. While many online gaming communities are positive, it's important that we equip our students with the tools to navigate these spaces safely and to speak up if they encounter anything inappropriate.

Finding That Healthy Balance

My biggest takeaway for all of us is the importance of **open communication**. Talk with your teenagers about their gaming habits, what they enjoy, and any concerns you might have. Setting clear expectations around screen time, game choices, and online behavior is key. Let's also encourage a rich variety of activities – sports, clubs, hobbies, and plenty of family time – to ensure they're growing into well-rounded individuals.

Video games are a significant part of our students' world. Together, we can help them develop responsible habits that will serve them well, both on and off the screen.



Blood Donation Requirements for High School Students

Thank you for your interest in donating blood. By donating blood, you are giving life to someone in need.

So that we can provide the safest possible donation experience, selection criteria include a table based on height and weight to determine if students are eligible.

FEMALE donors who are 18 years old and younger must weigh 110 lbs. or more, depending on their height. See chart:

We're proud to partner with iQ Credit Union to bring financial education—and a little red and black plaid—to our campus!






WHS Robotics Team 13601 - A place for Everyone!

FAFSA & WAFSA Application Information

What are FAFSA and WAFSA?

- FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) is the form you need to fill out to apply for federal financial aid for college and participating career and trade programs.
- WAFSA (Washington Application for State Financial Aid) is for students not eligible for FAFSA.

Where to Apply

• FAFSA: studentaid.gov

WAFSA: wsac.wa.gov/wafsa

Important Dates

- FAFSA: The 2026-27 application is expected to open on October 1, 2025.
- WAFSA: The 2026-27 application is also expected to open in October 1, 2025.
- **Priority Deadlines:** Be sure to check with your specific colleges and universities for their priority deadlines, which are often much earlier than the federal or state deadlines.

Why apply for FAFSA/WAFSA?

- Access money for college and participating career and trade programs: This is the first step to getting grants, scholarships, loans, and work-study funds to help pay for tuition, books, and living expenses.
- It's FREE: The applications are completely free to submit. You have nothing to lose!
- You may be eligible for more than you think: Don't assume you won't qualify. Many families are surprised by the aid they can receive.
- **Early is best:** Complete your application as soon as possible to meet priority deadlines and have the best chance at securing aid.
