Beaver Robotics

Robotics this season is playing a game called "Center Stage." The robot has many tasks including moving hexagonal pixels, using a flap door, and parking at the end by hanging from a bar. The team is 17 members strong and continuing to grow! We have our first Competition November 4. This season we will have 2 robots, Competition and Practice. This will allow us more time for drivers to practice and a place to put R&D parts while we work out the tweaks without compromising the competition robot. This will help make our robot reliable and consistent.

Academic Success

Credit recovery classes are now incorporating some life skills like organization, prioritization, and time management. We're tracking how quickly (or slowly) students are moving through their online classes and helping them get started again when their progress slows. We're working on using email regularly to communicate professionally. We're helping students understand what to do when they get stuck, how to ask for help, what resources they have at their disposal, how to talk to teachers, and how to problem solve. The goal is that students leave our credit recovery classes with more skills than they came to us with and won't need another credit recovery class in the future.

Video Club

Video Club just wrapped up a celebratory episode of the Beaver Broadcast in honor of Hispanic Heritage month. We've added new members as well as a Video Production class and have started creating projects for teachers across the school. Our club and class are very diverse and serve a large population of impacted students. We are preparing for competitions in the spring and hope to host a student film festival at the end of the year. PSAT Testing

In the morning of October 25, all Sophomores will take the PSAT here on the Woodland High School campus. Students do not need to register or do anything special to participate. Teachers will plan accordingly, so there will be no need for sophomores to connect with their teachers ahead of time about being out of class that morning.

Teenagers and Social Media

If you've been to a 9th grade parent night in the last few years, you probably know that I'm not a fan of social media, especially in the hands of teenagers. Although there are benefits to social media, I have observed a lot more negative impacts than I care to.

A lot of research has been done around the impact of social media on teenagers. In the following paragraphs, I'll summarize the findings described in two articles posted (ironically) online. If you'd like to read those articles for yourself click <u>on this link</u> and <u>on this</u> <u>link</u>.

Although estimates on the exact percentage vary, it's clear that a large portion of human communication is nonverbal. That means that much of the meaning that we humans derive from our communications with others come from things like facial expressions, tone of voice, and body posture. Social media eliminates those nonverbal components and places the communicators into a "non verbal context."

The risks to teenagers communicating within this nonverbal disconnected world can be stark. According to two studies published in 2019, teens who use social media multiple times or for multiple hours each day are at increased risk for poor mental health. Another study examining social media use among college students found that the longer the study participants used Facebook, the more they became convinced that others were happier than they were.

The indirect nature of social media communication also creates a sort of anonymity between users. Through social media, it's much easier for the initiator of the communication to disconnect from the impacts of what's being communicated. In short, it's far easier to be cruel online. Donna Wick, Ed.D., notes that this seems to be especially true for girls, who typically don't like to disagree with one another in person.

Fortunately, experts note that there are things parents can do. Setting reasonable limits on social media use can be helpful, along with monitoring students' accounts and having open conversations about the dangers (and advantages) of social media use. Genuine face to face contact with friends is also extremely helpful, one of the many reasons why many studies over the years that participation in extracurricular activities predicts better school and life outcomes for students.

1.Grapes originally came from Spain. Spanish explorers first brought the fruit to America 300 years ago.

- 2. Grapes are a type of berry
- There are more than 8,000 grape varieties from about 60 species
- 4. Raisins are dried, sweet grapes. The drying happens naturally when the grapes are left in sunlight.
- 5. Grapes come in many colors, including green, red, black, yellow, pink, and purple. "White" grapes are actually green.
- 6. One cup of grapes, with about 100 calories, provides more than a quarter of the daily recommended values of vitamins K and C. Grape seeds, which are edible, are chock-full of antioxidants.

Grapes are nicknamed "Nature's Candy," because of their sweetness. They come in many colors, including green, red. black, yellow, pink and purple. White grapes are actually green.
