PROHIBITION OF HARASSMENT, INTIMIDATION, AND BULLYING

The board Woodland School District is committed to a safe and civil educational environment for all students, employees, parents/legal guardians, employees, volunteers, and community members that is free from harassment, intimidation, or bullying.

Definitions

"Harassment, intimidation, or bullying" means any <u>intentionally intentional</u> written message or image—___including those that are electronically transmitted—___verbal_act, or physical act, including but not limited to one shown to be motivated by race, color, <u>religion</u>, ancestry, national origin, <u>religion</u>, <u>creed</u>, gender, sexual orientation <u>including</u>, gender expression or identity, <u>age</u>, <u>veteran or military status</u>, mental or physical disability, or other distinguishing characteristics, when anthe message or act:

- 1. Physically harms a student or damages the student's property;
- 2. Has the effect of substantially interfering with a student's education;
- 3. Is so severe, persistent, or pervasive that it creates an intimidating or threatening educational environment; or
- 4. Has the effect of substantially disrupting the orderly operation of the school.

"Other distinguishing characteristics" can include, but are not limited to: physical appearance, clothing or other apparel, socioeconomic status, weight, and marital status. Nothing in this section requires the affected student to actually possess a characteristic that is a basis for the harassment, intimidation, or bullying.

"Other distinguishing characteristics" can include but are not limited to physical appearance, clothing or other apparel, socioeconomic status and weight.

"Intentional acts" refers to the individual's choice to engage in the act rather than the ultimate impact of the action(s).

Behaviors/Expressions

Harassment, intimidation, or bullying can take many forms, including, but not limited to it slurs, rumors, jokes, innuendoes, demeaning comments, drawings, cartoons, pranks, gestures, physical attacks, threats, or other written, oral, or physical or electronically transmitted messages or images actions.

Conduct that is "substantially interfering with a student's education" will be determined by considering a targeted student's grades, attendance, demeanor, interaction with peers, participation in activities, and other indicators.

"Intentional acts" refers to the individual's choice to engage in the act, rather than the ultimate impact of the action(s).

Expression

This policy is not intended to prohibit expression of religious, philosophical, or political views, provided that the expression does not substantially disrupt the educational environment. Many behaviors that do not rise to the level of harassment, intimidation, or bullying may still be prohibited by other district policies <u>and/</u>or building, classroom, or program rules.

Training

This policy is a component of the district's responsibility to create and maintain a safe, civil, respectful, and inclusive learning community and will be implemented in conjunction with annualcomprehensive training of students, staff, and volunteers.

Prevention

The district will provide students with strategies aimed at preventing harassment, intimidation, and bullying of students. In its efforts to train students, the district will seek partnerships with families, law enforcement, and other community agencies organizations.

Interventions

Interventions are designed to remediate the impact on the targeted student(s) and others impacted by the violation, to change the behavior of the perpetrator, and to restore a positive school climate.

_The district will consider the frequency of incidents, developmental age of the student, and severity of the conduct in determining intervention strategies. <u>InterventionsDepending on the frequency and severity of the conduct, the district</u> will <u>range from respond to harassment, intimidation, or bullying with counseling, correcting behavior and correction, discipline, and/or referral to law enforcement <u>referrals</u>.</u>

Students with Individual Education Plans or Section 504 Plans

If allegations are proven that a student with an Individual Education Plan (IEP) or Section 504 Plan has been the target of harassment, intimidation or bullying, the school will convene the student's IEP or Section 504 team to determine whether the incident had an impact on the student's ability to receive a free, appropriate public education (FAPE). The meeting should occur regardless of whether the harassment, intimidation or bullying incident was based on the student's disability. During the meeting, the team will evaluate issues such as the student's academic performance, behavioral issues, attendance, and participation in extracurricular activities. If a determination is made that the student is not receiving a FAPE as a result of the harassment, intimidation or bullying incident, the district

will provide additional services and supports as deemed necessary, such as counseling, monitoring and/or reevaluation or revision of the student's IEP or Section 504 plan, to ensure the student receives a FAPE.

Retaliation/False Allegations

Retaliation is prohibited and will result in appropriate discipline. It is a violation of this policy to threaten or harm someone for reporting harassment, intimidation, or bullying.

It is also a violation of district policy to knowingly report false allegations of harassment, intimidation, andor bullying. Students or employees will not be disciplined for making a report in good faith. However, persons found to knowingly report or corroborate false allegations will be subject to appropriate discipline.

Any employee who has witnessed or has reliable information that a student has been subjected to harassment, intimidation, or bullying/cyberbullying, whether written, verbal, or physical, will report such incident to an appropriate school official. Any student, parent/legal guardian, or volunteer is strongly encouraged to report such incident to an appropriate school official.

Compliance Officer

The superintendent will appoint a compliance officer as the primary district contact to receive copies of all formal and informal complaints and ensure policy implementation. The name and contact information for the compliance officer will be communicated throughout the district.

The superintendent is authorized to direct the implementation of will develop procedures addressing the elements of implementing this policy.
