I am honored to be the Superintendent for Woodland Public Schools during these exciting times in the history of our school district. Over the last several years, your schools have seen significant growth - both in terms of our enrollment (which has grown by about 10% in the last five years) and improved the academic performance of students (which has also shown recent significant growth). The purpose of this report is two-fold. First, we aim to share with you information about many aspects of the performance of your school district. Second, we aim to share with you how we seek to improve outcomes for all students and prepare them for their future.

The graduating class of 2020 started kindergarten just a few months after the introduction of the first iPhone. Facebook was launched before most of them could walk or talk. Few have ever seen a payphone. When they were born, the Roomba (vacuum robot) was state-of-art for artificial intelligence. iPods, Xbox, WiFi, and Google have always been a part of their world. What does their future hold?

Growing evidence suggests that technology will dramatically change the adulthood today's students will experience. There are many, including economists, futurists, and researchers who predict a future with fewer family-wage job opportunities for students who do not have some sort of post-high school training. Many of today's jobs, from truck-driving to bricklaying to food preparation are already being, or soon will be, replaced by technology.

Most school districts view their end objective as ensuring students graduate from high school. Your school board has set a higher standard. Our job is to prepare each student for responsible citizenship and a future of adaptability and success. GRADUATION RATE

The four-year graduation rate will be at or above 85% by 2021.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

The rate of chronic absenteeism will be no greater than 10% by 2020.

STUDENT PROFICIENCY

80% of students will meet the standard on state assessments for Mathematics and English Language Arts (ELA) at <u>all</u> grade levels by 2020.

Student performance will improve year-over-year <u>and</u> exceed that of similar school districts.

STUDENT GROWTH

Student growth in ELA and Mathematics assessments will exceed 50% greater than that of similar school districts.

High School freshmen course failure will be below 10% for core subject classes - Math, English, and Science.


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Vision Statement

for the 2018-19 School Year








